ormer Illinois congressman Adam Kinzinger will discuss his bestselling memoir Renegade: Defending Democracy and Liberty In Our Divided Country, which captures one of the most transformative periods in recent history and recounts his time in public service.

From 2011–2022, Congressman Kinzinger served six terms in the U.S. House of Representatives, representing Illinois's 16th Congressional District. As one of only two Republicans on the non-partisan Select Committee to Investigate the January 6th Attack on the United States Capitol, Rep. Kinzinger stood against his own party.


While in Congress, Kinzinger also served as a member of the House Committee on Energy and Commerce and the House Foreign Affairs Committee, where he served as Ranking Member of the Subcommittee on Europe, Eurasia, Energy and the Environment in the 116th Congress. Prior to his political service, Kinzinger served in the Air Force in both Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom.

Mr. Kinzinger will be joined in conversation by journalist Steve Edwards, the award-winning journalist, interviewer and host of such acclaimed programs as WBEZ's Eight Forty-Eight and The Afternoon Shift. Presented in partnership with multiple Illinois libraries.


