iving green infrastructure, sometimes called nature-based solutions, is an essential element of climate adaptation and can provide significant environmental, social, and economic benefits. Yet green infrastructure remains the exception rather than the norm in building, site, and public development in the Chicago region and North America.

Learn about green roofs and walls, bioswales/rain gardens, urban trees, permeable pavement systems, wastewater treatment wetlands, and other nature-based strategies that have successfully been used in urban and suburban settings.

This program features Dr. Francine van den Brandeler and David Yocca, FASLA, PLA. Dr. van den Brandeler is a postdoctoral researcher in environmental social sciences at the Swiss Federal Institute of Aquatic Science and Technology, co-author of the 2021 United Nations Global Environmental Outlook for Cities, and an expert in multiscale governance advising the Illinois Groundwater Advisory Committee. She is an associate for climate and water at Greenleaf Communities.
